Shale Play Environmental Issues

The perfection of hydraulic fracturing techniques to unlock gas from shale formations may be one of the greatest developments in hydrocarbon production since Howard Hughes invented the rotary drilling bit, but it has created a host of new environmental concerns. This presentation addresses legal issues relating to water supply for fracturing operations, management and reuse of flow-back water, public concerns regarding chemicals used in the fracturing process, discharge or disposal of flow-back water that cannot be reused, allegations of groundwater contamination from fracturing operations, benzene emissions associated with shale gas production, and nuisance issues associated with the conduct of fracturing operations in close proximity to residential areas.

The Continuing Evolution of the ERCOT Market Design: Nodal and Beyond

Although there is a temporary freeze on most proposed market design changes in the near term, a flurry of new market rules can be expected in the future as ERCOT adapts to the Nodal market conversion and wrestles with the economic impacts of renewable resources and other emerging technologies. Market realities are forcing stakeholders to rethink entire market definitions and configurations—from the kinds and volumes of ancillary services ERCOT procures to the long-term sustainability of the energy-only market design.
