- Immigrants make up 25.2 percent of the labor force in the Dallas metro area.

- Total Dallas foreign born population = 326,825

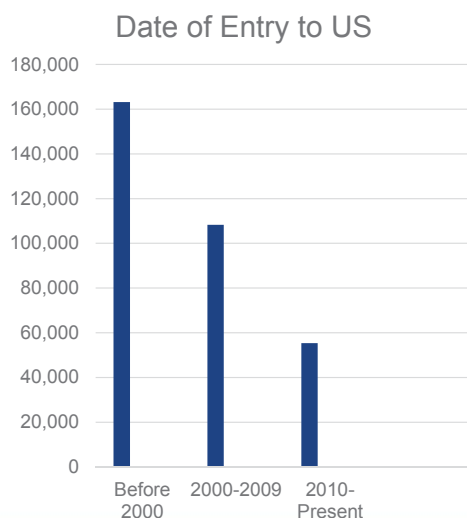
- Total Dallas population = 1.3 million
