### **Unemployment Insurance Basics**

- System based on fault, not need
- UI benefits are for those who are unemployed through no fault of their own
- System is financed entirely by employers
- Any school employee is covered

#### **Hurdles for Claimants**

- Monetary qualification
- Out of work through no fault of their own
- · Continuing eligibility requirements
- Any of these can prevent payment of UI benefits

## **Wage Suppression**

- If a claimant has base period wages from a school district, is between academic terms, and has reasonable assurance of continuing employment in the following term, benefits may not be based upon the school wages
- The claimant might qualify for lower benefits based upon non-school wages

#### **Substitute Teachers**

- Failing to follow established policy on staying in contact with the district can merit an investigation
- Completing an assignment with no further work immediately available = layoff, but refusing an offer of suitable new work without good cause merits disqualification (prior to claim: voluntary leaving; post-claim: work refusal)

#### **Follow Your Own Policy**

- Giving prescribed number of warnings helps show that a person knew or should have known their job was on the line
- Following that and other policies helps show consistency of treatment, which is essential for defending against unemployment and discrimination claims
