#### **CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES**

- Identifying the issues
- Strictly applying the Categorical Test
  - > What are the elements of the statute of conviction?
  - > What does the record of conviction show?
  - > Is it really a federally controlled substance?
  - Was it a federally controlled substance at the time of the arrest?
- Preserving the issues
- > Marshaling your evidence of the statute's overbreadth

### Realistic Probability

- Vazquez v. Sessions, 885 F.3d 862 (5th Cir 2018)
  - > OK; Possession of a Controlled Substance
  - Categorical Approach
    - > OK statute of conviction broader than federal analog
  - Realistic Probability
    - > A defendant must point to an actual case

#### Realistic Probability

- Lopez Ventura v. Sessions, 907 F.3d 306 (5th Cir 2018)
  - > LA; Possession of CS (AB-CHMINACA), retroactivity
  - > After arrest, but before conviction, drug added to federal schedule of controlled substances
  - > Check your drugs and check your dates

## Realistic Probability

- Vetcher v. Barr, 953 F.3d 361(5th Cir 2020)
  - > TX; controlled substance TX HSC 481.113(d)
  - > Not a facial categorical match
  - > Failed realistic probability test
