#### **Discussion Points:**

#### What are the mental health diagnosis labels that give you the most distress and why:

#### **Discussion Summary:**

- Borderline Histrionic
- Un-medicated/denial illness
- Narcissistic
- Bipolar- behavior never changes, addiction/can't change the meds
- Personality disorders- paranoids, sociopaths, things that can't be fixed w/ therapy or meds
- Substance and alcohol abuse
- Untreated diagnoses. Treatment is so important. Treatment is a good thing
- Borderline because they are tricky; hard to recognize and diagnose; resistant

### If there is a severely limited budget, what are the custody issues of the most importance? (Social Studies/Amicus/Psychological Evaluation/ other witnesses):

#### **Discussion Summary:**

- Depends on issues—maybe social study, who will actually interview teachers/etc.? or Amicus who actually does their investigation.
- Social study is the most cost efficient, possibly Amicus attorney if you can get a good one. Parenting facilitator would help a lot. Use caution when bringing in other witnesses, ie., therapists because then you have poisoned the well.
- Education; quick intervention; social study when cost is an issue. If no budget limitations; forensic psychological evaluation—evaluator develop conclusions while gathering data and information. Appoint facilitator for parenting.

#### Reoccurring substance abuse: What types of possession options are possible?:

#### **Discussion Summary:**

- See paper for today = use a monitor service/limit length of access/ counseling.
- Monitored access/not allow parent to drive/ keep cell phone with older kids
- Educate children about substance abuse signs and what to do
- Random testing
- Ankle bracelet
- Supervision
- SoberLink
- Mutual injunction stair step possession based on sobriety or clean drug tests or counseling, etc.
- Also depends on the facts—i.e. what kind of drug? Meth or Marijuana
