Formation Documents

- What happens if you don't file anything?
 - General partnership (no filing required to form)
 - However, an assumed name certificate should be filed in each county in which a business office is maintained
- All other business types require a filing with the TX SOS
 - Certificate of Formation
 - publicly filed document
 - basic forms available from Secretary of State website

Formation Documents

- Certificate of Formation Requirements for a Texas LLC
 - Name of the entity and type of entity
 - Purpose (can be any lawful purpose)
 - Duration (default is perpetual unless you state otherwise)
 - Registered agent and registered address
 - Member or Manager Managed?
 - Name/address of governing persons (initial members or initial managers)
 - Name/address of organizer (can be any authorized person)

Formation Documents

- Company Agreement
 - Substantive provisions are typically in the company agreement rather than the certificate of formation
 - If there is no company agreement, or if company agreement is silent, the statute (Texas Business Organizations Code for Texas entities) provides a default rule
 - With a few limited exceptions, any provision of the TBOC applicable to LLCs may be waived or modified in the company agreement
 - What provisions cannot be waived or modified? (TBOC § 101.054)
 - » An LLC must have at least one member
 - » A distribution is prohibited when it would leave liabilities greater than assets
 - » Cannot unreasonably restrict a person's right to access records and information
 - · Freedom of contract
