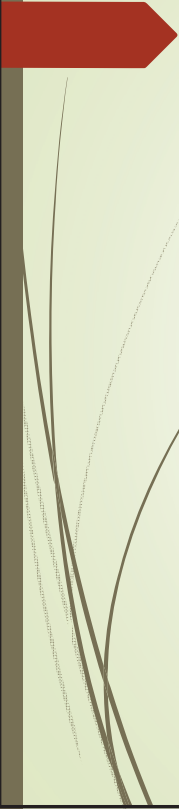

“The Record” in a Contested Case

- Each pleading, motion, intermediate ruling;
- Evidence received or considered;
- Statement of matters officially noticed;
- Questions and offers of proof, objections, and rulings on them;
- Proposed findings and exceptions
- Each decision, opinion, or report by presiding officer;
- All staff memoranda or data submitted to or considered by the hearing officer or members of the agency who are involved in making the decision.

Handling Confidential Records @ State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH)





(1) Be proactive and prepared

- Review all files, documents to be filed, anticipated exhibits, etc. to identify all categories of potentially confidential information
- Consider various categories: privileged; confidential by law; exempted from PIA disclosure; personal identifiers, etc.
- Determine obligations under applicable law and SOAH Rules
- Consider whether information is relevant or necessary to resolution
- Communicate effectively with other counsel/litigants
- Organize information for future ease of handling



(2) Follow SOAH Rules regarding handling of confidential information

SOAH Rule § 155.103, Public and Confidential Information

- Parties must protect confidential information filed/offered at SOAH
- Confidential documents are not e-filed
- Contemplates redaction when unnecessary for resolution of case
- Parties may challenge redaction or confidentiality designation
- Notes that SOAH designation as “confidential” does not determine whether it is subject to PIA disclosure

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
