### Te xas Constitution of 1876

- Two Important provisions regarding mineral reservations
- First Article VII, Section 2: Creation of the PSF
  - All funds, lands and other property here to fore set a part and appropriated for the support of public schools; all the alternate sections of land reserved by the State out of grants here to fore made or that may here after be made to railroads, or other corporations, or any nature what so ever, one-half of the public domain of the State, and all sums of money that may come to the State from the sale of any portion of the same, shall constitute a perpetual public school fund

#### Permanent School Fund

- This set a side more than 42 million acres of public free school land
- ▶ Today, that has led to more than \$11 billion dollars deposited into the permanent school fund from production of oil and gas on state lands.
- ▶ \$2 Billion dollars into the PSF last year
- ▶ Overa Billion dollars last yearwas oil and gas revenue
