



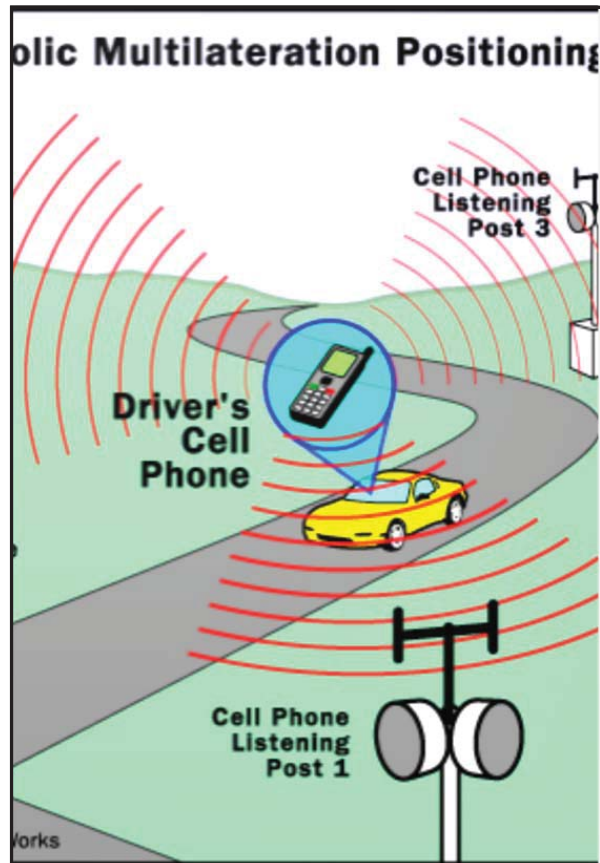
Pending Issues on Petition for Discretionary Review in the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals
