



- The issue today is authentication
 - Without an expert witness

- 2. Social media postings
- 3. Metadata
- 4. GPS

Admissibility and Authentication

- TRE 104(a) admissibility
 - Question of law for court
 - Not bound by evidence rules
 - Only threshold necessary
 - Jury decides weight of evidence
- · Evid. inadmissible unless authenticated
- TRE 901(a) authentication
 - "[p]roponent must produce evidence sufficient to support a finding that the item is what the proponent claims it is."
