## ***THE PRIVILEGE***

- Protects from compelled disclosure every communication (written or verbal) that is:
  - between an attorney and the attorney’s client,
  - made in confidence, and
  - for the purpose of obtaining legal advice
- Protects only the communication
  - does not protect underlying facts and circumstances about which the client seeks or obtains legal advice
