IV Interview

- CO: Your child that was born in Mexico, what is his or her name?

IV Interview

- Karen: Ruby and she is 16 years old. She has DACA.
- CO: When did she come to the United States?
- Karen: in 2006 when her father died and she came to live with me.
- CO: I cannot approve you. You are inadmissible because you are an alien smuggler. You do qualify for a waiver.

IV Interview

- What if Karen was a minor when she entered EWI and she entered with her younger brother and sister.
- Would this change the outcome?
