A. ABA Formal Opinion 477R, 5-22-2017

- It's OK to Communicate CCI Via the Internet IF You're Reasonably Careful So ...
 - Emailing CCI is OK
 - Texting CCI is OK
 - · Online file sharing of CCI is OK

That is, it can be

A. ABA Formal Opinion 477R (cont'd)

- It's OK to Communicate CCI Via the Internet IF You're Reasonably Careful
 - "Reasonable Efforts" to Protect CCI Are <u>Always</u> Required

In <u>all</u> communications by <u>any</u> means the lawyer must always take "reasonable efforts to prevent inadvertent or unauthorized access."

I.e., the duty regarding electronic communications is same as for the duty regarding non-electronic communications – no more, no less.

A. ABA Formal Opinion 477R (cont'd)

- It's OK to Communicate CCI Via the Internet IF You're Reasonably Careful
 - "Reasonable Efforts" Means "Extraordinary Efforts" in Certain Cases

"Special security precautions" may be required—

- By agreement with the client
- By law
- If "the nature of the information requires a higher degree of security" ... Or ...
- If the circumstances of the client require a higher degree of security
