What is Outcome-Based Grantmaking?

- Is it . . .
 - "results or incentive-based" grantmaking?
 - "pay-for-performance" contracting?
 - a "prize"?
 - "recoverable grants"?
 - nothing more than clearly defined targets and well-drafted milestones?

- One possible definition:
- Incentivizing (or penalizing) a partner to achieve (or for the failure to achieve) specific and measurable project outcomes, often with grant funds directly linked to such outcomes.
- Example:



Example: A Reinvented Toilet



- Goal: provide communal/public toilet services that result in a positive user experience (clean, safe, etc.) in resource-poor communities
- Challenges: significant project risk cleanliness of toilets, responsibility and funding for maintenance, certainty of government matching funds
- Approach: Outcome Investing
 - Create data "baselines" and measure success in terms of replication of the toilet design/model outside the project area during the life of the project
 - Reward replication through modest incentive payments
 - If desired results achieved, more toilets, less donor subsidy, number of users expanded

What it looks like in practice: grant agreement

- Award amount referenced as "up to" potential total disbursements
- Milestones/Deliverables created as a results framework with baseline, target and "exceeds target" goals, with payments tied to achievement of target and "exceeds target."
 - "Exceeds Target" phrased as an amount paid to grantee per toilet replicated outside the project area (up to a maximum)
- Evidence of achievement must be satisfactory to the donor; right to "audit"/inspect project records
