How Often Have You Heard?

- If I go to work I will lose my benefits.
- I can only a certain amount of money each month or I will lose my benefits.
- I can't get the skills and experience I need for a career without losing my benefits.
- If I go to work and then stop working, I won't be able to get back my cash benefits or Medicaid back.
- If I go to work Social Security will send me a letter asking for a lot of money back.



SSI's Most Important "Rules"

- Individuals on SSI who work always have more money in their pocket at the end of the month. It is always financially better for individuals receiving SSI to work, even those receiving a home and community based services waiver.
- 2. "Supplemental Security Income (SSI) recipients, their representative payees, and deemors must report wages monthly." —SSA Program Operations Manual System SI 00820.143 Monthly Wage Reporting



Basic Terms

- SSA: Social Security Administration
- SSI: Supplemental Security Income
- **SGA**: Substantial Gainful Activity. \$1,220 monthly gross earned income non-blind, \$2,040 blind (2019). Once awarded SSI, Substantial Gainful Activity has nothing to do with SSI work activity.



Purpose of SSI

- The basic purpose of SSI is to assure a minimum level of income to people who are aged, blind, or disabled and who have limited income and resources below SSA specified amounts.
- Most other income/resources an individual has will reduce the amount of the SSI monthly cash benefit.

Supplemental Security Income as a Disability Benefit

- Adult Supplemental Security Income (SSI) is not a "disability only" benefit program.
- Adult SSI is a "you get benefits based on your inability to do substantial gainful activity due to your disability" benefit program.
