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THE PROBLEM:

TOO MANY GOLF COURSES

Texas:	742 , 4 th after Florida, California and New York 12 closed/ 1 opened (Top 5 for closures- 2017)
US:	205 closed/ 15 opened (2017)
1986-2005 -	+ 44% supply
2006-date -	- 7% supply
Future prediction -	- 1.5% reduction annually
