## DACA and Supreme Court

- Oral Arguments heard on November 12, 2019
- ▶ Decision on case expected by Summer 2020
- Supreme Court Litigation Combines 3 cases:
  - Regents of the University of California v.
    Department of Homeland Security (9th Cir.)
  - Batalla Vidal v. Nielsen (2<sup>nd</sup> Cir.)
  - NAACP v. Trump (D.C. Cir.)



## Litigation Update: Public Charge



- DHS Final Rule, "Inadmissibility on Public Charge Grounds", 84 Fed. Reg 41292 was scheduled to take effect midnight EST October 15.
- The DHS Final Rule was enjoined nationwide on Friday October 11.
  - Nationwide Injunctions: Make the Road (S.D. NY); NY Attorney General (S.D. NY); WA Attorney General 14-State (E.D. WA).
  - Partial Injunction in California, Oregon, DC, Maine, Pennsylvania: CA Attorney General and La Clinica de la Raza, et al. (N.D. CA).
- DOS Interim Final Rule, "Visas: Ineligibility Based on Public Charge Grounds," 84 Fed. Reg. 54966, published on October 11 and remains in effect.

## Presidential Proclamation – Insurance for **Immigrants**

- On October 4, 2019, President Trump issued a Proclamation prohibiting the entry of immigrants "who will financially burden the United States healthcare system."
- The Proclamation, which takes effect at 12:01 am on November 3, 2019, states that a foreign national will burden the U.S. healthcare system unless he or she will be covered by an approved health insurance within 30 days of entry in the United States;
  - Unless, the alien has the financial resources to pay for reasonably foreseeable medical costs.
- The Proclamation does not apply to certain foreign nationals, including those who held an immigrant visa prior to the effective date.
- Private health insurance is considered as a positive factor in the public charge determination under State's Interim Final Rule.
