## Giving Circles

Wikipedia defines giving circles as “a form of participatory philanthropy where groups of individuals donate their own money or time to a pooled fund, decide together where to give these away to charity or community projects and, in doing so, seek to increase their awareness of and engagement in the issues covered by the charity or community project. Many circles, in addition to donating their money, also contribute their time and skills to support local causes.”

FORMED AROUND IDENTITY.



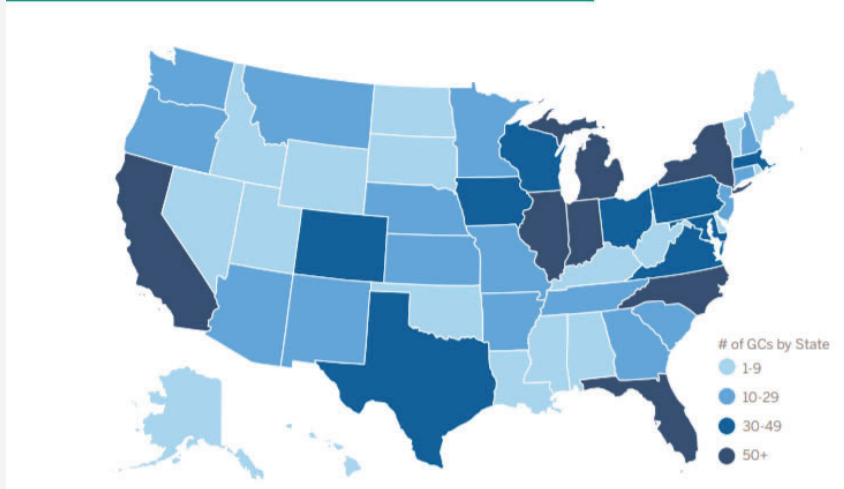
ABOUT **70%**

# Landscape

- An estimated 150,000+ donors have given up to \$1.29 billion through giving circles.
- 84% of giving circles make grants in their local geographic area
- Giving Circle host organizations do so to contribute to their community's culture of philanthropy, reach new and /or diverse set of donors, and increase community visibility.
- Hosts offer services to giving circles such as serving as the fiscal sponsor and providing administrative support for everything from member communication to educational opportunities to grant management.
