- “I,____, do solemnly swear that I will support the Constitutions of the United States, and of this State; that I will honestly demean myself in the practice of law; that I will discharge my duties to my clients to the best of my ability; and, **that I will conduct myself with integrity and civility in dealing and communicating with the court and all parties.** So help me God.”

Texas Lawyer’s Creed – A Mandate For Professionalism

- Intended to be a “definitive statement of professionalism for Texas Lawyers.”
- The Creed is not a legally binding document and has no enforcement mechanism.
- The Creed is aspirational and serves as a reminder and declaration of the ethical and professional standards of practice Texas lawyers should aspire to.
- The Texas Lawyer’s Creed reminds attorneys that Lawyers have ethical and professional duties to four different systems:
 - I. The Legal System
 - II. To the Client
 - III. To Other Lawyers, and
 - IV. To the Judge

Texas Disciplinary Rules of Professional Conduct



- Mandatory minimum standards for ethical conduct expected by Texas lawyers
- Violations are handled in accordance with the Texas Rules of Disciplinary Procedure
- Rules are frequently cited in malpractice cases when evaluating whether the appropriate standards for professional conduct have been observed.
