Patentable Subject Matter

35 U.S.C. § 101 - Inventions Patentable:

Whoever invents or discovers any <u>new and useful</u> process, machine, manufacture, or composition of matter, or any new and useful improvement thereof, may obtain a patent therefor, subject to the conditions and requirements of this title.

Eligibility Framework (Alice)

- Step 1
 - Are the claims directed to a patent ineligible concept?
 - Laws of Nature
 - Natural Phenomena
 - Abstract Idea
- Step 2
 - If so, does the claim contain an "inventive concept" sufficient to "transform" ineligible concept into a patent-eligible subject matter?

Judicial Exceptions

Laws of Nature

- Gravity
- The chemical principle underlying the union between fatty elements and water.

Natural Phenomenon

- Naturally occurring plants and minerals
- Isolated naturally occurring DNA fragments (Myriad)
- Naturally occurring associations between genes and diseases

Abstract Ideas

- Intermediated settlement (Alice)
- Risk hedging (Bilski)
- Managing relationships or transactions between people (buySAFE)
- Collecting, analyzing, and displaying information (Electric Power Group)
