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ACCOMMODATION UNDER THE FHA

42 U.S.C. 3604(f)(3)(B)

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Statutory Authority – 42 U.S.C. 3604(f)(3)(B)

A reasonable accommodation is a change, exception, or adjustment to a rule, policy, practice, or service that may be necessary for a person with a disability to have equal opportunity to use and enjoy a dwelling, including public and common use spaces.

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Typical requested animal accommodations

- Waive a “no pets” policy or restrictions on breed and size of animal.
- Waive a pet or animal deposit.
- Waive restrictions on where and when animal is allowed in common and public use areas.



Who has a right to an accommodation?

- A person with a “handicap.”
 - A mental or physical impairment
 - That substantially limits a major life activity.
- Who needs the accommodation in order to equally use and enjoy a dwelling.
