National Security Threats to U.S. Tech Companies

- Per the U.S. Government, foreign adversaries are increasingly creating and exploiting vulnerabilities in information and communications technology and services ("ICTS") in order to commit malicious cyber-enabled actions.
- Unrestricted acquisition or use in the U.S. of ICTS designed, developed, manufactured, or supplied by persons owned or controlled by foreign adversaries augments the ability of foreign adversaries to create and exploit vulnerabilities in ICTS, with potentially catastrophic effects, thereby posing a national security threat.
- To deal with this threat, the U.S. has taken a number of steps to protect the security, integrity, and reliability ICTS provided and used in the U.S.

The Export Administration Regulations

- The Export Administration Regulations ("EAR") (15 C.F.R. Part 730 *et seq.*) govern the export, reexport or transfer in country of most U.S. dual-use commodities, software and technology ("items").
- The EAR are administered by the Department of Commerce's Bureau of Industry and Security ("BIS").
- Note: The International Traffic in Arms Regulations ("ITAR") regulate the
 export of defense articles, including technical data, and defense services.
 The ITAR are administered by the State Department's Directorate of Defense
 Trade Controls.
