### Competent and Diligent Representation

- "A lawyer shall not accept or continue employment in a legal matter which the lawyer knows or should know is beyond the lawyer's competence." Texas Disciplinary Rule of Professional Conduct 1.01
- Novel legal issues due to COVID include:
  - Employment Law
  - Health Law
  - CARFS Act
- Can obtain competence through study and investigation

#### Competence and Technology

- Rule 1.01, comment 8: Lawyers "should strive to become and remain proficient and competent in the practice of law, including the benefits and risks associated with relevant technology."
  - Video conference platforms
  - Accessing email and documents remotely
  - E-filing with courts

#### Communication

- Rule 1.03:
  - (a) A lawyer shall keep a client reasonably informed about the status of a matter and promptly comply with reasonable requests for information.
  - (b) A lawyer shall explain a matter to the extent reasonably necessary to permit the client to make informed decisions regarding the representation.
