





- Had a good idea (and case law supports) of what constitutes a disability.
- Now, consider CDC guidelines regarding certain underlying medical conditions considered increased risk for severe illness from COVID-19.
 - Severe illness from COVID-19 is defined as hospitalization, admission to the ICU, intubation or mechanical ventilation, or death.

CDC - INCREASED RISK



- Cancer
- Chronic kidney disease
- COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease)
- Down Syndrome
- Heart conditions, such as heart failure, coronary artery disease, or cardiomyopathies
- Immunocompromised state (weakened immune system) from solid organ transplant

- Obesity (BMI of 30 kg/m2 or higher but < 40 kg/m2)
- Severe Obesity (BMI \ge 40 kg/m2)
- Pregnancy
- Sickle cell disease
- Smoking
- Type 2 diabetes mellitus
