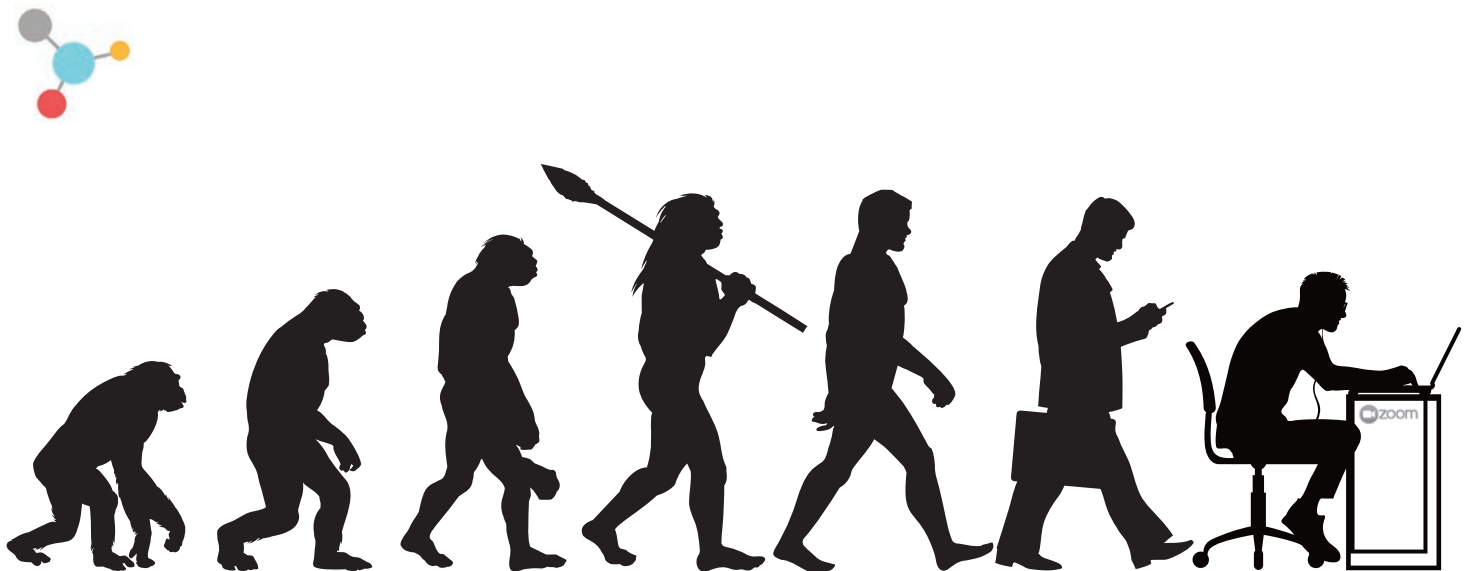

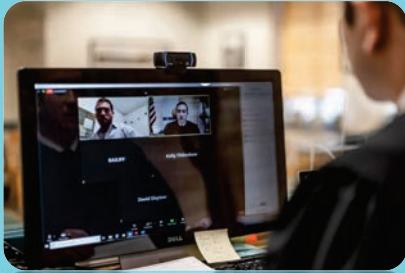

- Your fear is legitimate



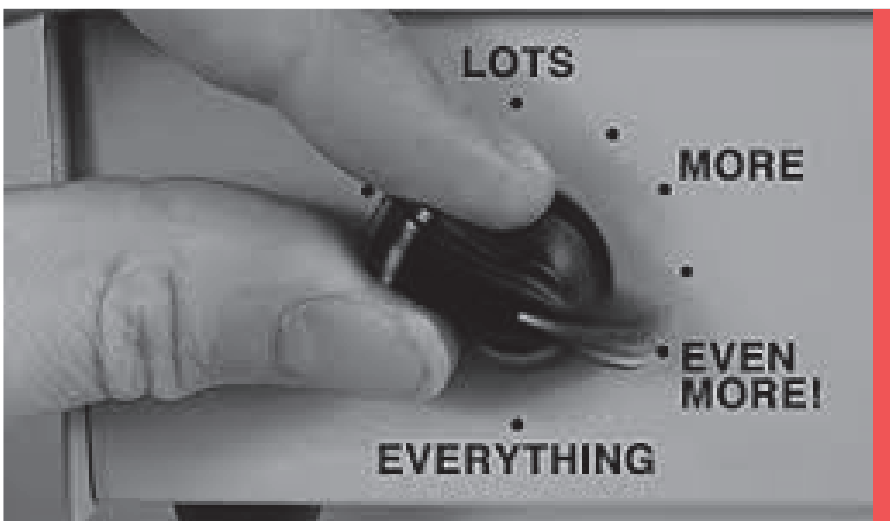
Misconceptions When Conducting Remote Proceedings
