Who is responsible for putting the Standards together?

- The Texas Title Examination Standards are the result of a joint project by two sections of the State Bar
 - Real Estate, Probate and Trust Law Section
 - Oil, Gas and Energy Law Section
- In 1989, the Real Estate, Probate and Trust Law Section approved the formation of a committee

Who is responsible for putting the Standards together? (cont.)

- In 1994, a dozen real estate lawyers and oil and gas lawyers started meeting quarterly
- The then-Oil, Gas and Mineral Law Section agreed to co-sponsor the project
- The Texas Title Standards Joint Editorial Board was formalized – 12 board members
 - 8 from REPTL and 4 from OGERL
