EVIDENCE EXISTS &
TESTING IS POSSIBLE

EVIDENCE EXISTS

If no longer in possession of the State, a written explanation is required

Convicting court may reach decision without affidavits or evidentiary hearing

Mere assertions or general claims insufficient - FACTS

Is it the *type* of evidence that will yield DNA results?

BIOLOGICAL MATERIAL

- In possession of State...

Blood, semen, hair, saliva, skin tissue/cells, fingernail scrapings, bone, bodily fluids, or *other identifiable biological evidence that may be suitable for forensic DNA testing*

- Enumerated items = *per se* biological material
- Must prove it exists in “other” items
