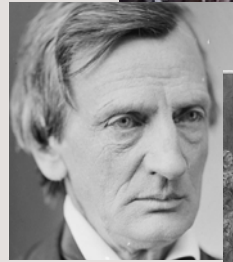

EARLY ORIGINS



“Rehearing” comes the Court of Chancery in England – until the Chancellor affixed his seal to a decision, case could be reheard by his counselors ad infinitum.



Early U.S. common law courts could reconsider any decision until the court’s term expired.
