

Passed: 1,246 (bills)/13 (joint resolutions)

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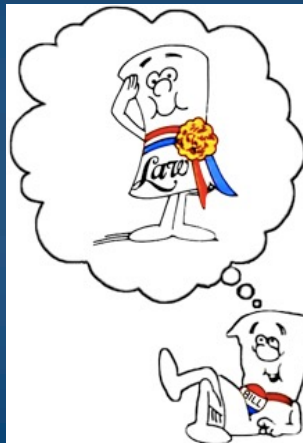
88th Lege Demographics

 - 12 – Senate

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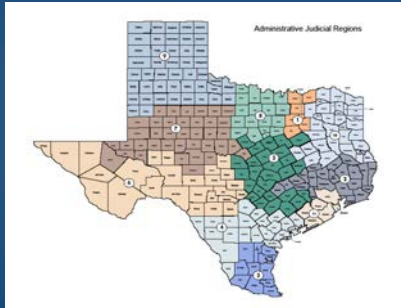
Bills that Passed



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Civil Justice System – Trial and Intermediate Appellate Courts



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HB 19 – Specialty Trial Court (Business Court)

- Creates a statewide specialized civil trial to hear certain business-related litigation cases, such as actions against businesses, accusations of wrongdoing by businesses or their members, disputes between businesses, violations of the BOC, Finance Code, and Business & Commerce Code.
 - Tier One - \$10 million in controversy (commercial disputes)
 - Tier Two - \$5 million in controversy (business governance)
 - Supplemental jurisdiction
- The business trial court will be composed of up to 16 appointed judges (in 11 different administrative judicial regions) serving 2-year terms.

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
