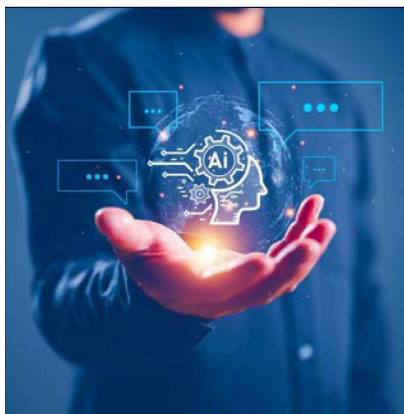


Use Case
