- APTRA passed by 64th Legislature
- Signed into law by Governor Briscoe April 22, 1975
- Effective January 1, 1976
- Codified as chapter 2001 of the Texas Government Code, 1993

Long answer: federal act, model act, and pre-1975 Texas cases challenging actions of state agencies

- Federal Act P.L.79-404, 60 Stat. 237 (1946);
- 5 U.S.C. sections 701-706.
- Model State Administrative Procedure Act, 1961, National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform Laws

Texas Pre-1975

- We had state agencies and courts reviewing their work long before we had the APA
- The Railroad Commission of Texas was the first Texas agency., Const. art. X section 2 (1890), established by the Legislature in 1891.
- Third Court of Appeals established 1892.
