


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
#### The Rule of Capture pp. 393-98

- If you're pumping oil from a well on your tract, there's no liability for draining oil & gas from under another's tract
  - Avoids legal disputes about where oil came from—if it's produced from your well, it's yours
- This does not authorize trespass, including drilling under another person's property
- Also subject to correlative rights doctrine



#### Same Rules Apply to Fracking: No Slant Wells






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### Coastal v. Garza Energy Trust (Tex. 2008) pp. 420-23
