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# Consular Processing

## STEPS:

1. Prerequisite to Visa Issuance
2. Identifying the correct U.S. Consulate
3. Complete the DS-160 nonimmigrant visa application
4. Schedule an appointment and determine local U.S. Consular Requirements
5. Assemble the visa application and determine the visa fees
6. filing the application: interviews (or waiver), approvals, and anticipate delays
7. Using the visa to enter the U.S. and additional entry requirements and considerations

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## Step 1

Prerequisite to Visa Issuance: I-797 Approval (unless presenting a nonimmigrant visa directly at a U.S.

Consulate or port of entry, i.e. TN, E, or some L visa applicants)

- no I-94 if consular notify
