License Changes: Open to Open

Why do noncommercial open source projects change their licenses?

- Adjustment from permissive to copyleft or vice versa
- Picked the wrong license
  - o OpenSSL
  - o Wikipedia
  - Stack Overflow
- These initiatives can take years or crater
- Often requires relicensing by contributors
  - Permissive -> copyleft does not, but notices must be retained

## Corporate Moves to Copyleft (or GPL to AGPL)

- Usually part of a dual-licensing model
- Examples
  - Artifex
  - iText
  - o Grafana
- "Gotcha" versus Stewards
  - Sales team or compliance police?
  - Continued maintenance and support for community edition
