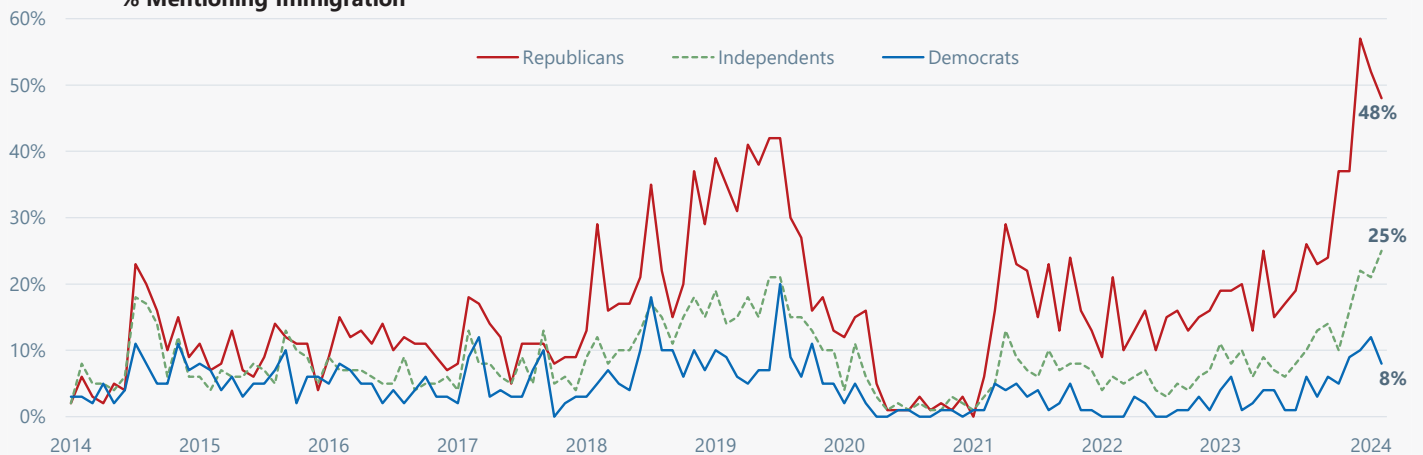

What is Fueling the Immigration Fire?

- 8 years of relentless demonization & disinformation
- Non-stop media coverage
- Political Gamesmanship
 - Chaos caused by busing migrants to Democratic cities
 - Congress is unwilling to legislate & Executive authority is limited (and challenged in court)
- Biden administration's delay in tackling it head-on
 - 70% disapproval of President Biden's handling of immigration among adults.
 - 60% of voters feel like they hear more from Republicans than Democrats or President Biden on the issue of immigration.

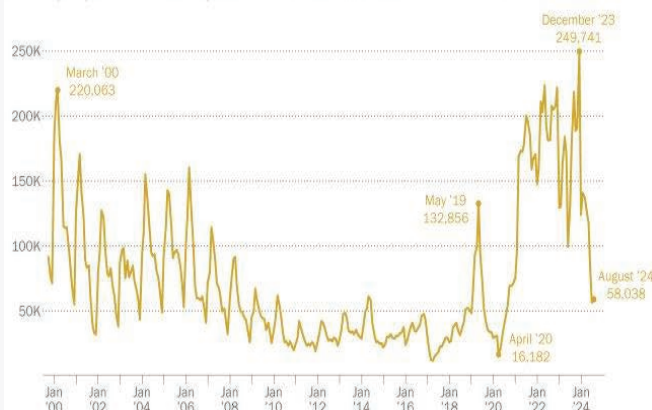

Unprecedented Challenges at the Southern Border

Encounters with migrants at the U.S.-Mexico border peaked in December 2023 but have plummeted since then

Monthly migrant encounters by U.S. Border Patrol at the U.S.-Mexico border



Note: Beginning in March 2020, monthly totals combine apprehensions and expulsions into a new category known as encounters. Monthly totals before March 2020 include apprehensions only. Some migrants are encountered more than once.

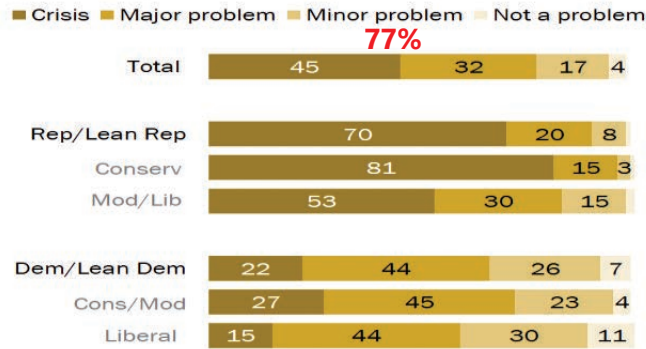

% who say the large number of migrants seeking to enter the U.S. at the border with Mexico is (a) ...

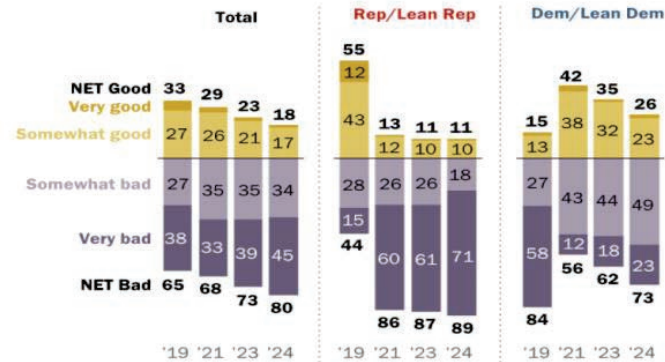

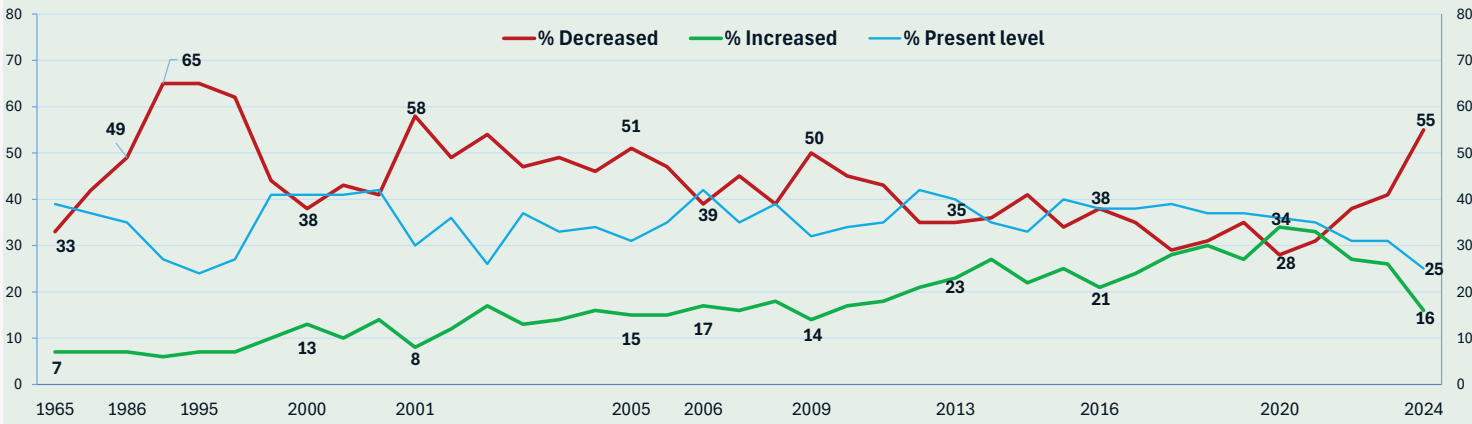
