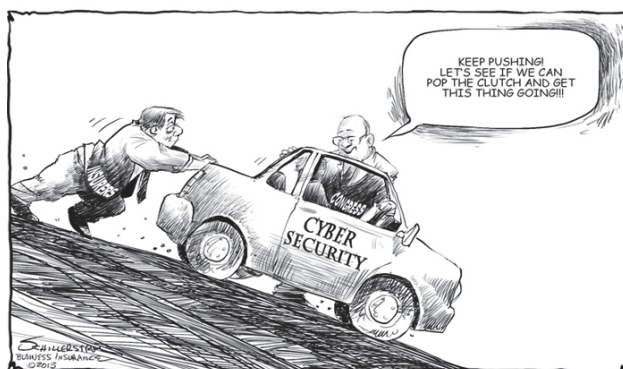

Minimizing Risks (Non-Technical)

- Stay apprised of threats (e.g., ISACs)
- Conduct a data inventory
- Develop appropriate policies and procedures
- Train employees on security issues
- Conduct tabletop exercises
- Manage vendor risks
 - Due diligence
 - Contract provisions
 - Training and audit

Minimizing Risks (Technical)

- Patching and vulnerability management
- Penetration testing
- Detailed logging
- Firewalls
- Anti-Virus tools
- Encryption
- Behavior analytics
