

SB17 Information for MCLE Accreditation

UT Law CLE is available to assist Texas Law departments, centers, and *sponsored* student organizations in applying for continuing legal education credit for qualifying conferences, symposia, and similar events. We are *not* able to assist *registered* student organizations, but those groups may apply directly to the State Bar of Texas to request MCLE credit for an event.

When MCLE credit is offered in connection with any Texas Law event, it is considered a “training” under Texas state law [SB17](#). Accordingly, the event cannot be designed or implemented in reference to race, color, ethnicity, gender identity, or sexual orientation.¹

If you seek UT Law CLE’s assistance in arranging credit for an event, the director of the center, institute, or program or the faculty advisor for the sponsored student organization must sign below to attest that:

“The event is not designed and will not be implemented in reference to race, color, ethnicity, gender identity, or sexual orientation. The program agenda does not refer to any of these prohibited categories, and speakers have been informed of the SB17 restrictions and our expectations that they will adhere to them.”
