

1. What's New in 2016 PJC

- Each volume lists what is new at the beginning of the volume.
- Generally the 2016 volumes incorporate statutes and cases through the end of 2015.
- We added a new Oil and Gas volume.
- Family and Probate updated due to legislative changes and *Obergefell v Hodges,* legalizing same-sex marriages.
- "The big three" volumes expanded their scope beyond their titles.



A. Multi-Volume Changes

 Nabors Well Services, Ltd. v. Romero, 456 S.W.3d 553 (Tex. 2015)

Jury can decide whether failure to wear a seat belt caused or contributed to cause plaintiff's injury.

Import—chapter 33 of the Civil Practice and Remedies Code requires percentage comparison of *injury*—not occurrence.

Note added to all volumes with a comparative causation question:

In most cases injury should be used, not occurrence.

• Preservation updated in all volumes.
