What is a Special Purpose District?

- Areas of the state, county, municipality, or other political subdivision that have been divided for judicial, political, electoral, or administrative purposes
- Originally created due to urban sprawl and the desire of suburban residents to create entities that could provide their own infrastructure and levy taxes for limited purposes, such as firefighting, road construction, and water and sewage treatment
- Limited purpose (road, water, sewer, drainage infrastructure; specific authorized improvements; emergency, hospital, public safety, utility services)

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Benefits:

- Accommodate and accelerate desirable growth and tax base expansion without burdening existing residents
- >> Tools to drive higher-quality development than what would otherwise occur without special purpose district financing
- Over time vs. up front funding reduces financing risks and carrying costs that are normally passed on to homebuyers through higher lot prices and home prices
- >> Mitigate entitlement risks for Developers
- Offset city or county costs to extend infrastructure without reducing city or county bonding capacity
