Knowing IP Client Matters

- Ethical duties based on client relationship.
 - Competence
 - Diligence
 - Confidentiality
 - Communications
 - Loyalty
 - Reasonable fees
- Legal duties.
- Disqualification.

Forming Client Relationship

- A relationship of client and lawyer arises when:
 - A person manifests to a lawyer the person's intent that the lawyer provide legal services for the person; and
 - either
 - · lawyer manifests consent; or
 - lawyer fails to manifest lack of consent <u>and</u> lawyer knows or reasonably should know the person reasonably relies on lawyer to provide the services.

Restatement (Third) of the Law Governing Lawyers § 14

The Entity As Desired Client

 "A lawyer employed or retained by an organization represents the organization acting through its duly authorized constituents."

ABA M.R 1.13(a); 37 C.F.R. 11.113(a)

- But that general rule does not automatically insulate lawyer from claim that someone else also was the lawyer's "client"
 - e.g. Family of companies.
