## Be aware of the Rules & policy that govern settlement of your case

#### **APA**

Sec. 2001.056. INFORMAL DISPOSITION OF CONTESTED CASE. Unless precluded by law, an informal disposition may be made of a contested case by:

- (1) stipulation;
- (2) agreed settlement;
- (3) consent order; or
- (4) default.

#### **APA**

- Sec. 2001.003. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:
- (1) "Contested case" means a proceeding, including a ratemaking or licensing proceeding, in which the legal rights, duties, or privileges of a party are to be determined by a state agency after an opportunity for adjudicative hearing.



#### APA

- Unless an Agency's enabling statute or rules preclude certain types of settlement (be hard to imagine many scenarios where this would occur), then as a staff attorney, why aren't you utilizing this provision of the APA?
- In turn, as a defense counsel why aren't you pushing for one of these modes of settlement?

### **Disciplinary matrices**

- Many agencies have them published in their administrative rules and on their website.
- Is the proposed offer within the range of discipline for your client's violations?
- As a defense attorney, you should know the Licensing Agency's matrix, particularly when the offer exceeds the range of discipline.
- As a staff attorney, you should justify why the order exceeds the range.
- Conversely, as a defense attorney, your counter-offer must explain why your proposal is less than the minimum discipline.
