# Important Reporting Concepts

- Texas law says anyone who has reasonable cause to believe a child, elderly person or adult with a disability is being abused, neglected, or exploited must report.
- A professional may not delegate to or rely on another person to make the report.

## What can CPI Investigate?

#### **Alleged Victim Defined**

- Children aged 0-17

  Alloged Perpetrator Define
- **Alleged Perpetrator Defined**
- Age 10+
- A person traditionally responsible for the child's care, custody, or welfare
- Family Member (blood or marriage)
- A member of the child's household
- School personnel or volunteers at the child's school

# Types of Abuse

### State law requires DFPS to investigate reports of child abuse or neglect, for the primary purpose of protecting children from:

- Physical Abuse\*
- Sexual Abuse\*
- Emotional Abuse
- Labor Trafficking
- Sex Trafficking
- Forced or Coerced Marriage Abuse

- Neglectful Supervision\*
- Physical Neglect
- Medical Neglect
- Abandonment
- Refusal to Assume Parental Responsibility
